

FUNDING COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS PROGRAMS: A GUIDE FOR INTERNET USERS

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About Resources for Community Corrections and Public Safety

As the number of persons under supervision has grown steadily over the past two decades, agency administrators, leaders and citizens have looked for ways to build more cost effective programs. These programs range from in-prison job training and industries to community-based programs where offenders reside in halfway houses and report to work, pay fines and learn life skills that will make them more productive citizens. Not only has the need for in-prison treatment programs expanded but the number of persons under supervision in the community has continued to grow.

There is a growing recognition and commitment at all levels of government to funding community-based correctional programs as part of a

continuum of public safety measures. Although there is always risk of harm to the public, a coordinated use of justice resources, based on research and proven practices, can in fact make a huge difference in whether an offender stays compliant or returns to a life of crime.

Those developing such programs can look for technical assistance, funding, training and information dissemination at the federal, state and local levels of government. The intent of these governments is to improve the quality of correctional supervision and to prevent future crimes by preventing recidivism.
